RESEARCH ASSISTANT AYTEN BENGISU CANSEVER HAS SUCCESSFULLY PASSED HER THESIS PROPOSAL EVALUATION!

Ayten Bengisu Cansever, a Research Assistant in the Department of Communication and Design at Istanbul Gelişim University (IGU), Faculty of Fine Arts (FFA), has successfully passed her thesis proposal defense.



Research Assistant Ayten Bengisu Cansever, from the Department of Communication and Design at Istanbul Gelişim University (IGU), Faculty of Fine Arts (FFA), has successfully presented her "doctoral thesis proposal" as part of her doctoral education in Public Relations and Advertising at Istanbul University's Institute of Social Sciences. The proposal, titled "A Study On Presence Of Positive Psychology's 'Promise Of Happiness' In New Media In The Context Of Neoliberal Governmentality", was deemed suitable by the members of the proposal jury for further research as part of her doctoral thesis during the Spring Semester of 2022-2023.

Cansever mentioned that in today's world, where everything has turned into an investment, the unique emotion of happiness is also considered as a new form of capital. She stated that this idea reflects itself in various fields, including psychology, economics, and media. She continued by saying, "In economics, this situation manifests itself as the happiness economy, and we begin to see the methods of making ourselves happy through positive psychology." She pointed out that, from a Foucauldian perspective, the media is an important apparatus in which we internalize all of these, as happiness is associated with consumption and commodified in advertisements. She noted that it can be read as one of the significant areas where happiness is standardized. Cansever stated that the subject of our time sees happiness, which is now associated with consumption or making investments, as a form of selftechnology and considers it as a key to being "more successful." Therefore, she emphasized the importance of discussing these promises of happiness that captivate us in populist discourses in the new media. She concluded her statement by expressing gratitude to her esteemed thesis advisor, Assoc. Prof. Dr. Nilnur Tandaçgüneş, and the distinguished jury members, Prof. Dr. Sevimece Karadoğan Doruk and Prof. Dr. Gürdal Ülger, for their approval and support in this matter.

RES. ASST. TUĞÇE ÖZTÜRK AND RES. ASST. MUSTAFA DALLI PRESENT THEIR PAPERS AT THE CONFERENCE HELD IN MACEDONIA!



Istanbul Gelisim University (IGU), Faculty of Fine Arts (FAF) Interior Architecture and Environmental Design Department Research Assistant Tuğçe Öztürk and Interior Architecture and Environmental Design (Eng.) Department Research Assistant Mustafa Dallı, at the "9th International Conference in Skopje, North Macedonia". On New Trends in Architecture and Interior Design (9th ICNTAD'23)", they presented their papers titled "Rethinking Open and Green Spaces in Architecture and Urban Realm After Covid-19 Pandemic: The Case of Istanbul". Researchers from many different countries participated in the conference chaired by Prof. Dr. Burçin Cem Arabacıoğlu.

ACADEMIC SUCCESSES

Emphasizing that the impact of the global COVID-19 pandemic process on cities and urban life, and the inclusion of social distance in our lives, brought up the importance of open and green spaces in architecture and urban areas, Öztürk and Dalli stated that the time we spend in our homes and our immediate surroundings have increased with the pandemic process. Stating that this situation differentiates and diversifies our expectations from both our house and the region where our house is located, Oztürk and Dalli emphasized that open and green spaces that were not on our priority list before the pandemic and use that meet our outdoor needs such as gardens, terraces or at least balconies in homes gain much more importance. Therefore, Öztürk and Dallı stated that these needs started to cause changes both residential architecture and city planning, and they used the following expressions for their study; "The study aims to compile the design criteria of architectural design and the increasing need for open and green space in the urban area during the pandemic process and to architectural and urban design examples applied in this direction." At the conference, firstly examples from various cities of the world were presented and then the examples applied in Istan presented and analyzed.

As a result, Öztürk and Dallı emphasized that open and green spaces have many benefits such as a longer and healthier life, fewer mental health problems, and better cognitive function, and stated that the need for these benefits reached the highest level during the pandemic period. Öztürk and Dallı added that fact that one should always be prepared when the possibility of such global epidemics recurring is considered, and that the design criteria mentioned in the study should continue to be applied on an architectural and urban scale even if the pandemic process is over, and completed their paper presentations.

ABOUT OUR SKOPJE TRIP

Skopje, the capital of North Macedonia, is also its largest city. This historically and culturally rich city is located in the Central Balkans and has been under the influence of different civilizations throughout history. HOW IS THE SUMMER INTERNSHIP PROCESS GOING?

We answered the questions of our students from Istanbul Gelişim University (IGU), Faculty of Fine Arts (FAF), Gastronomy and Culinary Arts Department about the compulsory summer internship.

When is the earliest I can start my internship?

Within the scope of Summer Internship I and Summer Internship II, students can do their compulsory internship as of the second semester. Students continuing their education can do their internship in the summer term. However, there is no such requirement for graduate students. Summer semester internships start from the last day of the spring semester final exams. However, before you start your internship as of the last day of the final exams specified in the academic calendar, the internship start date must be notified to our department chair and dean at least 15 days before the internship insurance entry can be made.

Fill in the compulsory internship form on the computer and sign the student signature part. Have the Head of the Department and the internship place official sign the relevant fields. Have the internship start form approved by the student affairs (at least 15 days before the start of the internship) so that the insurance entry can be made.







Do I have to hand-deliver my internship documents?

Those whose internship place is outside of Istanbul; It is required to scan the internship start form (via a mobile application or a browser) and send an e-mail to gsfstaj@gelisim.edu.tr using the student e-mail address.

Those whose internship place is in Istanbul should hand over the internship start form in 3 copies. The insurance procedures of the students whose application form is approved are initiated by Istanbul Gelişim University.










INTERNSHIP ORIENTATION WAS HELD!



Çağla expressed the conceptual infrastructure of the digital works in the online exhibition with these words: "We believe that art is humanity's way of making sense of and expressing the world. Human images are one of the most powerful and meaningful elements of art. The "Similars" exhibition offers an opportunity to explore different techniques and materials related to human images and their creation. The purpose of this exhibition is to explore how human images can be expressed in art and to present them in a new perspective. The "Similars" exhibition was created to reflect the universal meaning and depth of human images.

This exhibition has emerged with the combination of different digital techniques used in the creation of black and white human images. The exhibition consists of 15 works that have been transformed into digital portraits, which are the staining value of human images, based on portrait photographs. These works emphasize the diversity and meaning of human images in art.

The theme of "the ever-changing human form" plays an important role in the "Similars" exhibition. Human forms change and transform over time; gets old, gets younger, gets sick, gets better, gets sad and happy. This exhibition was also created to reflect this constant change of human images and to express this through art. The "Similars" exhibition offers an opportunity to explore the power and meaning of human images. This exhibition draws attention to the importance of the creation and expression of human images in the art world."






CAN THE KITCHEN BE SMART?

However, I can easily say that the rapid penetration of these technologies into our kitchens depends on our adoption and trust in innovative technologies.

Recently, I wanted to make Antep Kadayif. First, I got recipes from different recipe sites as the classic method. Then I created a new recipe for myself by comparing them. I did this in about an hour or so. It took a little too much time, I said okay. I think it's better to take time to plan ahead than to be frustrated later.

In the future, according to the innovative approach brought by Industry 4.0, robotic systems will replace human power. For example, we or a robotic system will place the marinated chicken in the oven, the oven will recognize the chicken and decide how to cook it. All machines in the kitchen will be in communication with each other via Wi-Fi connection. We will only have to buy the materials from the market and arrange them on the shelves that the robotic arms will use from there. Of course, if we want, we will be able to participate in food preparation by making the robotic system manual. Of course, all of this may seem too utopian. Finally, I can say this. In the very near future, we will start to see real robotic systems in our kitchens.





PIONEERS OF THE ARTS

MARK ROTHKO (1913 - 1970)



Mark Rothko was an American abstract artist known for his large-scale colorful field paintings. He was born on September 25, 1903 in Dvinsk, Russian Empire (now Latvia), and immigrated to the United States with his family in 1913. Rothko is considered one of the most influential figures of the abstract expressionist movement.

Rothko's signature style included the use of rectangular forms and exploration of color relationships. His paintings often consist of vibrant, solid-colored rectangles stacked or floating on a background, creating a sense of depth and emotional intensity. **Rothko** believed that color had the power to evoke deep emotions and spiritual experiences. Throughout his career, Rothko's work has evolved, moving from more representative and surrealist-inspired pieces to iconic large-scale color space paintings. Characterized by simplified forms and intense color combinations, his later works are often regarded as meditative and transcendent.







Mark Rothko's paintings have been exhibited in major galleries and museums around the world, including the Museum of Modern Art (MoMA) in New York, the Tate Modern in London, and the National Gallery of Art in Washington D.C. Rothko, who struggled with depression in the last years of his life. He died on February 25, 1970 in New York. But his legacy as an artist continues to inspire and captivate audiences.







HIGHLY EXPECTED KADEBOSTANY ALBUM: "PLAY THIS AT MY FUNERALS"

Founded in 2008 under the leadership of songwriter/producer/DJ Guillaume de Kadebostany, the Swiss electronic pop group debuted in 2023 with a brand new album. "Play This at my Funerals", the band's 4th album, is a production that blends folk, electronic and pop music together again.





The group, which has been progressing on a rising axis for the last 10 years, made their biggest debuts with "Castle in the Snow" and "Walking with a Ghost". Kadebostany strives to present a modern vision of pop music, defined by the band leader's definition as "sophisticated music with mass appeal". Kadebostany's songs have been listened to more than 1 billion times on Youtube, dominated the charts in more than 30 countries, and performed more than 700 live performances in more than 25 countries in recent years. In this sense, they seem to provide the vision they are talking about. In addition, Kadebostany seems to have come out of these processes renewed every time, although risky situations have arisen as she has continued on her way with her third vocals in the last ten years. He continued with Kristina Yakovleva after the departure of Amina Cadelli, who was remembered for her steamy voice in the song "Castle in the Snow" in the most important album of the group, Pop Collection. Since 2020, he has been on his way with Célia Serrao. Apart from the fact that the band, which has the habit of producing their own songs in different versions over and over, and working with different artists from different countries while doing this, they also prefer to work with different vocal artists in some of their songs, apart from changing their own vocals. "I don't want to confine my music to a single vocal," explains Guillaume de Kadebostany.



"Play This at My Funerals" is a very personal album that represents a series of songs that Guillaume de Kadebostany would like to be played at his funeral. The album consists of 12 songs that highlight Kadebostany's acclaimed mastery of sophisticated modern pop. It is an album that brings together folk elements, electronic pop music, different instruments and different vocals, making you cry with laughter. On the one hand, it is quite emotional and on the other hand, it is a very interesting production that radiates cheerful melodies. The song "Euphoria", which they worked with Barış Demirel, is one of the most suitable for this definition. This 12-track album, which can become one of the classics in the history of Kadebostany, is quite ambitious:



ICONIC STRUCTURES

THE LARGEST WOOD STRUCTURE IN THE WORLD: METROPOL PARASOL



Located in the Plaza de la Encarnacion in Seville, the "Metropol Parasol" is known as the largest wooden structure in the world.

As a result of a project competition, the building was selected among 65 applications and was designed by Jürgen Mayer in 2011 and is also called "Sevilla Mushrooms" or "Seville Umbrellas". It is known that the area where the building is located was previously used as an open-air market for years, where the remains of Morocco and Rome were located, and after this value was realized, it was decided to use the area as a museum where the remains could be exhibited, not as a parking lot as previously determined. This project successfully highlights that Seville is one of the most fascinating centers for cultural events. Metropol Parasol offers a modern and innovative design while being elegantly integrated into the city's skyline. Reflecting the historical and cultural texture of Seville, this building provides visitors with an impressive experience and increases the vitality of the city. With its design that contrasts with the traditional urban fabric, it manages to become an "icon space" that gives the city its identity.



The building includes restaurants, a performance square, an archaeological museum and a traditional market. In addition to these, there is a roof terrace where the panoramic view of the building is exhibited. The structure consists of six parasols resembling large mushrooms, inspired by the cellars of Seville Cathedral and the ficus trees in the nearby Plaza de Cristo de Burgos. This building, which started to be built in 2005 and took longer than 2007, was completed in 2011 with a redesigned project after structural revisions and carrier problem. solving the building, which is also known as Seville's Eiffel Tower and which thousands of tourists flock to every year, consists of four floors, one of which is the basement. The architect of the building, Jurgen Mayer, expresses his views on the production process of this iconic building with the following words in an interview:



"It is true that a public space in Seville needs shade above all else. We gave the most importance to this requirement. That's why we covered the square with this mesh geometry. Construction work was completed last year and Seville residents are already starting to explore the potential of this project in various opportunities. They use Metropol Parasol to showcase many events."

AMERICAN HONEY

(ANDREA ARNOLD, 2016)



American Honey (2016),

is an American and British coproduction road and travel film directed by Andrea Arnold. The film tells the story of a team that travels from city to city, selling magazine subscriptions and making a living in this way, and Star, who has just joined this team.


In the first scenes of the movie, we watch Star's life before she joins the team. The director does not prefer to introduce Star with her direct entry into the team. She wants the audience to know Star fully and to know the reasons that made Star decide to join the team. Thus, Star's interactions within the team will be better understood.

The team that Star sees in the first place is a community that has excessive fun, enjoys their togetherness, spends time listening to music and dancing, does not care about existing daily problems, and whose sole purpose in life is to pursue happiness. All Star wants is to get rid of the pressure of her super ego, like the band members dancing wildly and having fun by climbing over the market counters while keeping up with the music playing in the market. The super-ego, which he internalizes and directs his behavior, has reached such ugly points that it pressures him to take care of his siblings instead of his irresponsible parents, to assume the role of a parent, and even to assume the role of a wife or lover by being abused by his alcoholic father. The fact that the normative values that Star finds true no longer carry the same accuracy and that she feels suffocated in such values is reflected in the insects in the house she lives in and the flies that stay inside but cannot get out but repeatedly hit the window to get out. Star joins the team, not wanting to resist the weight of the roles imposed on her other than her own role and the pressure of her inner judgments.





Star tries to keep up with her new environment. This new order that started for Star expects Star to create its own reality. This order will begin to gain reality with Star's gaze and comments. Considering that the order in which it is included is a reality completely different from Star's previous reality, it will not be easy to create this new reality for Star or to recruit someone from a different reality for team members with similar realities. In the reality Star comes from, there are people, situations or feelings such as irresponsible parents, innocent children, alcohol, abuse, hunger, filth, fearlessness. There are feelings of lies, selfishness, hypocrisy, self-righteousness, loneliness and worthlessness that Star is unaware of but will realize over time, which attracts her because she thinks it provides the opposite conditions, and in the new reality she is included in. Star will come to terms with the fact that this environment, which she thought was very suitable for her, is not actually suitable, by inferring from the environment she saw only once in the first place. He will realize that he cannot transform himself, and as he gets to know the team, spends time with the team, gets involved in their daily lives and follows their routines, he will see that they are all different souls, they have fun on their own, and there is no shared happiness. The transformation in the character of Star, ethnomethodologically, exemplifies possible transformations in the influence of the individuals that make up the community. Interpersonal interactions depend on the way people view each other and the meanings they attach to each other. There is an interaction process that consists of the permissions given to each other by the receiver and the donor party. In the movie, these two sides change places, and the side that determines this transformation is Star. American Honey is a film that attracts the audience with the dynamism of its narrative, precisely with the way it conveys this sharp but stable transformation of the character.

And it was previously played by Haldun in Turkish theater another product of the theory of epic theater, also known as dialectical theater, whose examples we see from masters such as Taner and Vasif Öngören. On the way to buy fish, he encounters two soldiers who lost one of their friends, and with the offer of these two soldiers, he replaces the disappeared soldier, Jeraiah Jip. Jeraiah Jip is only the first character that Galy Gay takes on with her fading self...

INTERVIEW WITH ACADEMICS

WE TALKED WITH AYTEN BENGISU CANSEVER ABOUT ACADEMIC CAREER AND EMERGING SCHOLAR AWARD!



1. First of all, hello, sir. Could you introduce yourself? How did you become inclined towards academia?

Hello. First of all, thank you for giving me this opportunity for an interview. Academia has always been a field that I wanted to be part of throughout my educational journey, and it's an area where I wanted to continue my career. It's a field that I am wholeheartedly passionate about. Being an academic can be defined as a career that involves reading, writing, thinking, and continuously learning, and it's a career that can be pursued and enjoyed only by those who find pleasure in doing so. In that sense, it's truly a "crazy" job because there is no limit to learning and knowledge. However, I believe that only those who truly dedicate themselves can fulfill this profession properly.

But of course, in this part, I would like to share with you my journey from free to entering the "epistemic research community" of academia. First, let me briefly myself. I completed introduce undergraduate education as the top student in the Department of Public Relations and Advertising at Marmara University's Faculty of Communication in 2019. At the same time, through the double major program at the same university, I graduated with honors from the Department of Sociology (English) at the Faculty of Arts and Sciences. In 2021, I graduated from the thesis-based master's program in the Interpersonal Communication Science Branch of the Department of Public Relations and Advertising at Marmara University's Institute of Social Sciences, defending my thesis titled "Biopolitical Discourse and Narrative in Digital Games: The Example of The Sims 4." Currently, I am pursuing my postgraduate education in the Ph.D. program in the Department of Public Relations Advertising at Istanbul and University's Institute of Social Sciences. I am currently in the thesis stage. I can generally describe my academic research areas as communication sociology, communication psychology, new media, and communication studies. Since 2021, I have been working as a research assistant at Istanbul Gelisim University's Faculty of Fine Arts, Department of Communication and Design. I am still continuously striving to develop myself without standing still. As of February 2023, I have obtained the title of Family Counselor, and I am trying to find new areas that will contribute to my academic work.

2. You have numerous articles, book chapters, and conference papers in national and international fields. What is your motivation for your work, and what advice do you have for young people in this regard?

Honestly, as I mentioned from the beginning, my main motivation is being passionately committed to my work. I even wrote about it in the preface of my master's thesis. Weber's quote has always inspired me: "Nothing is worth pursuing if it is not pursued with passionate devotion." Learning new things, knowing, and conducting research are among the most enjoyable things in my life. In fact, the professor I had during my undergraduate and master's studies, Assoc. Prof. Dr. Hediyetullah Aydeniz, always motivated me in this regard. In every class, Mr. Aydeniz used to say to me, "An academician should have a concern about the world, and this concern should become a problem that he/she is curious about. Find yourself a concern and go to the field." These words have been influential in my concern for the problems related to the world and humanity and in channeling my curiosity to research them. Indeed, being an academic is not a career for those who do not have a cause or lack curiosity. Therefore, even in my daily life, when I go out on the streets, I always seek new concerns and try to address them within the context of my academic interests. I constantly ask myself "why?" I aim to approach a social aspect of that concern from a different perspective rather than a deterministic point of view. My publications generally emerge based on this line of thinking.



For young people who want to advance in academia, besides meeting the minimum requirements of ALES (Academic Personnel Postgraduate Education **Entrance** Exam) and YÖKDİL (Foreign Language Exam for Academic Purposes), I can say that they need to find a cause. Just like my mentor once told me, they should definitely find a cause for themselves. I know from my close circle that those pursuing a master's or doctoral degree often complain about writing theses and conducting research. The main reason, personally, is that the majority who embark on this endeavor cannot find a cause that both bothers them and brings them joy in tackling it. Those without a cause may have a slightly weaker interest in academia. I wish all academicians who have a cause they are interested in, curious about, and will one day find the answer to, as well as those in the process of embracing that cause, all the best throughout their lives.



3. Could you tell us about the Emerging Scholar Award you received, which was announced in recent months?

Certainly. I was honored with the Emerging Scholar Award at the Eighth International Conference on Communication and Media Studies, organized by Commonground Scholar and hosted by Complutense University of Madrid this year. After applying with my CV and academic works last year, I received this award as a result of a lengthy review process. Emerging Scholar is known as an award given to a limited number of active academicians who are continuing their postgraduate studies and are in the early stages of their academic careers, based on the evaluation of their CVs. It is a globally recognized award, and I will be receiving it from Turkey at the Eighth International Conference on Communication and Media Studies, which will be held at Complutense University of Madrid this year. Along with this award, I also have some responsibilities. For example, I will be chairing a session at the conference. In addition, under the special theme of the conference, "Who Can We Trust? Ethics and Responsibilities in AI in Digital Communication Systems," I will be presenting a paper titled "AI-Based Mobile Applications as a Power Technique in the Time of COVID-19: The Case of 'Hayat Eve Sığar'." The focus of my work is on "Foucault studies, biopower, neoliberal governance, and communication technologies." In short, the point I have embraced as my cause revolves around these concepts. It is possible to see traces of this in the paper I will be presenting at this conference. I plan to discuss mobile artificial intelligence applications that have become part of daily life during the COVID-19 period and encompass daily life in all aspects as a new technique of power, using the example of "Hayat Eve Sığar" in Turkey. Finally, I am very happy to have been honored with the "Emerging Scholar" award given to young academicians at the Eighth International Conference on Communication and Media Studies, which will be held this year. I can say that the Emerging Scholar Award has turned this conference into a more exciting and enriching experience for me.

We thank our graduate student Oğuzhan İstanbullu for this interview and wish her continued success in her professional life.







AI ENGINEERING


