

There Are In The Kitchen!



Children in the 7-8 age group entered the kitchen with the social responsibility project realized in cooperation with Istanbul Gelişim University, Fine Arts Faculty, Radio Television & Cinema Department, Gastronomy & Culinary Arts Department and Bahçelievler Şeyh Zayed Children's Homes Site.

With the project, which set out with the aim of ensuring that children in the 7-8 age group in love houses meet the field of gastronomy and participate in the production process, the value of making production was experienced by children, while at the same time, children were made aware of issues such as zero waste and recycling. Social responsibility project carried out under the supervision of Deputy Dean of Faculty of Fine Arts Sezgin Savaş, research assistants of Gastronomy and Culinary Arts Department Ayşe Seray Çetin, Emel Çirişoğlu and Department of Radio, Television and Cinema research assistants Eda Çekemci and Okan Kırbacı, it was aimed to raise awareness about transformation and development in the kitchen.

In the first phase of the project, the message "Waste-Free, Natural Production Is Possible" was given.





The students of the Department of Radio, Television and Cinema and the students of the Gastronomy and Culinary Arts Department participated in the project voluntarily and contributed to the children's having a pleasant time. While the students of the Gastronomy and Culinary Arts Department supported the children with their culinary skills, the students of the Radio, Television and Cinema Department shot footage to make these moments immortal.



SUBJECT: NATURAL COLORING

After a general briefing on the culinary discipline, the natural coloring processes, which were the subject of the first session, were explained to the children. Learning to make green and red colors from spinach and beets in accordance with the theme, the children prepared green and red cookies using molds of different shapes. At the end of the session, the students, who tasted, had the opportunity to experience the feeling of something they produced with their own handiwork.

With the project, which will continue with different sessions throughout October and November, it is planned to raise awareness of children about the importance of waste-free and natural production in the kitchen.



The interview event, which is the first stage of the social responsibility project titled "We Make Children's Dreams Come True with Make a Wish", organized in cooperation with Istanbul Gelişim University, Faculty of Fine Arts and Make-A-Wish Association (Make-A-Wish Turkey) was held on October 10, 2022, at IGU Tower Mehmet Akif Ersoy Conference Hall.

In the first phase of the project, the message "Making Children's Dreams Come True" was given.


THE PROJECT WILL CONTINUE WITH

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
PROJECTS THAT CAN FEEL EMERGED








CHARCOAL DRAWING WORKSHOP

FASHION PHOTOGRAPHY WORKSHOP





Istanbul Gelisim University (IGU), Faculty of Fine Arts (FAF) 2022-2023 Academic Year Academic Board Meeting was held was held on Friday, September 30, 2022 at K Blok Firnas Auditorium with the participation of academic and administrative staff of the FAF under the chairmanship of the Dean of the Faculty of Fine Arts, Prof. Dr. Şükran Güzin Ilıcak Aydınalp.

At the meeting, where information and reminders about the new period were made, the current student numbers of the departments, the introduction of the new academic staff joining the faculty, the number of students coming to the departments with horizontal/vertical transfer, guest students, the number of scientific publications of the academic staff, social responsibility projects, workshops and interviews carried out by the departments, interviews, exhibitions by lecturers, student exhibitions, awards won by lecturers and students, Monthly Bulletin of the Faculty of Fine Arts, student handbook and student orientation handbook, Faculty of Fine Arts website, social media accounts of the faculty, ART/icle: Art and Design Magazine were mentioned.

The Source of Life and the Indispensable of the Kitchen Water

ASST. PROF. DR. MURAT DOĞAN



Asst. Prof. Dr. Murat Doğan's new article titled "The Source of Life and the Indispensable Water of the Kitchen" appeared in the October issue of the Food Taste magazine. In his article, Doğan emphasized the importance of water in our lives by mentioning the importance of water, its physical properties, the use of water in the kitchen and its functions in the preparation of meals, the characteristics of good drinking water, and the chemical properties of water.

The article written by Asst. Prof. Dr. Murat Doğan is quoted as follows:

Although water, which consists of one hydrogen and two oxygen molecules, seems very simple in one way, it has taken its place as one of the most basic substances of our world with its mysterious properties. This colorless, tasteless, odorless liquid, which is indispensable for the continuation of life and the most important source of life for living things, shows unexpected physical and chemical properties that are different from other substances. These mysterious properties of water ensure the continuation of the life of all living things. In addition, it is important to know its function in the preparation of meals.

"The properties that make water mysterious and unique are still not fully understood."

However, the properties that make water mysterious and unique are still not fully understood. For example, the solid state of all other substances is denser than the liquid state. However, we cannot say this for water. But why? If water did not have this physical property different from other substances, ocean, sea and lake waters would start to freeze from the bottom. As a result, life under water would not continue.

Another feature of it was only fully understood in 1963. Tanzanian student Erasto experimented with ice cream in his school's kitchen, and it was found that hot water, which is another strange feature of water, freezes before cold water. Erasto puts his friend's cold milk mixture in the refrigerator with the hot milk mixture he prepared for making ice cream, and observes that the hot milk mixture freezes faster than the cold milk mixture. Erasto's culinary observation is announced to the whole scientific world with his name.



For the continuation of the life of every living element, water is an essential substance or, in other words, a chemical. A person cannot live very long without water and it is the main component of twothirds of his body, namely all his organs, tissues and body fluids. Human bones, teeth and hair contain very little water. Water is necessary for the digestion of food, its transport to the tissues and for the removal of harmful wastes formed as a result of their use in the cells. Water is excreted from the body through respiration, perspiration, urine and feces. It is necessary to replace the lost water and to maintain the water balance. For this balance, besides direct water intake, foods and beverages and the water released during the burning of food by the body are also used. Thousands of chemical reactions take place in the cells in which water plays a role for the continuation of human life.

Generally, the main component of all foods is water. It plays an important role in the preparation of dishes and in determining the flavor. We call the water we use in our kitchens as drinking water. This water is used for washing food, preparing meals, cleaning, washing dishes and in kitchens for drinking purposes. For example, there is a strong relationship between the shelf life of foods and the water contained in foods. Let's consider the amount of water in flour, milk, meat, vegetables and fruits and the shelf life of these products. All of them have different shelf life.

The most important physical properties of the water we use in the kitchens are pH, turbidity, color, odor and flavor. If there is a large amount of alkaline salts such as sodium, potassium, calcium, magnesium and calcium bicarbonate in drinking water, if there is too much carbon dioxide, it shows acidic properties. Drinking water should be neutral or slightly alkaline in terms of pH. Drinking water should be within the pH range of 7.0–9.0. Excessive alkalinity of water is a sign of putrefaction. Regardless of its source, it should be used in the kitchen, even if the turbid water goes through the purification process.

Good drinking water is odorless. There may be some reasons why the water contains odor. Some of these are the leakage of wastewater into the water mains, metals entering the mains water as a result of the corrosion of the water pipes, and chlorine or iodine used in water disinfection. The water should be natural and pleasant in taste. The flavor of water may vary depending on dissolved gases such as oxygen and carbon dioxide and other chemicals it contains. Drinking water should not be salty, sour or metallic in taste. When it is drunk, it should not cause bloating in the stomach.

Water is used in the kitchen for many processes such as boiling, boiling and steaming, as well as for washing dishes. We always use water while cooking. It helps many meals to be sensorially acceptable. It ensures that the heat is transferred to the meat evenly while the meat is boiled in the pot, and that the egg is cooked evenly while it is boiled in water. Water also helps speed up the cooking process under pressure. In the pressure cooker, the water heats up and turns into steam, and since the steam does not come out of the pot, the trapped water molecules create a high-pressure environment, allowing it to cook faster. It helps to bring out the flavor in the food. Whether we're making food, sauce, coffee, tea, or soup, none of this is possible without water. It is a flavor carrier in sauces. Sometimes when we don't want to add broth to a dish, we can use water that doesn't change the taste. When our sauce or soup is too thick, water helps thin it. If the soup is too watery, the excess water can be evaporated quickly by cooking without a lid. This evaporation process also leads to what we call the reduction process in cooking. As a result, water is so importan for our life and kitchen.

Antalya Golden Orange Film Festival was held in Antalya between 5-18 November 2022. Held for the 59th time this year, the festival was organized by ANSET under the auspices of Antalya Metropolitan Municipality.

Kerem Yükseloğlu, Lecturer/Director of Istanbul Gelişim University (IGU), Faculty of Fine Arts (GSF), Radio, Cinema and Television Department, participated in the festival, which includes national feature films, national documentary films, national short films and international feature films. He became a finalist in the "national short film competition" category with the movie "One Way" (Tek Yön). Yükseloğlu answered our questions about film creation and festival experiences.

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You have made us all proud by being a Finalist at the 59th Antalya Golden Orange Film Festival. First of all, we would like to congratulate you again. Can you tell us a little about your "One Direction" film, which competed in the festival's "national short film" category and made it to the finals?

One Way movie is a road story. In May 2018, we adapted a story that I wrote as a stream of thoughts while I was looking at a tiny snail stuck to my car window during a night trip. It is a very special story for me, although every story is special, but some of them have something more special, something deeper at their core. This is one of them. I wrote and put it on hold in a very short time, and even came to the brink of giving up, but as a result of the encounters and new contacts that took place, everything started again and grew into a movie. There is a main character in this story that I have unwittingly added a lot of myself to. Maybe that's why it seems so special to me, I don't know.

Can you talk about your experiences during the festival process? How did the screening and question-answer activity go?

It is a great feeling to be together with people who make films and to strengthen solidarity. We stayed in Antalya for a long period of time and met many "filmmakers" there, talked about common problems, had fun and learned a lot from each other. It is really a great chance for a short film to be watched with the audience on the big screen. I can say that it was an excitement that is impossible to describe.

I once again understood why Golden Orange is the biggest festival in Turkey. A huge city and the people of the city are so attached to the festival that it is possible to see the effects and traces of the festival in every street and every person with whom dialogue is made.

Telling a story, writing a story and sharing it with others is something I do instinctively. I can't imagine a life independent of it, away from it.

As an academic with a busy schedule, how do you manage to be so active in your professional life? To what do you owe your productivity? What are the factors that positively trigger you in the creation and production processes?

My schedule is actually busy with work that I love and do with passion. I don't think it's right to call it business. Telling a story, writing a story and sharing it with others is something I do instinctively. I can't imagine a life independent of it, away from it. It is one of the things that brought me into existence. Speaking of academia and professional life, I don't see myself as an academic in the full sense of the word, filmmaker might be a title that describes me better. I am telling what I know about my job, my passion and my field, cinema, which is one of the things I do with pleasure and love. In other words, I believe that everyone should share what they know with someone else, whether their job is education or not. Likewise, I enjoy sharing everything I know outside of university with someone.





Hiding information seems pretty selfish to me. That's why as long as I'm alive, I will tell stories, I will take care to live in touch with cinema and learn new things about cinema, and I will share what I have learned with others, regardless of place.

We have now entered a period in which the density has increased even more. When we were talking about both university and new projects, everything started to come together. Fortunately, my producer lipek Erden makes things much easier and more peaceful with her presence and endless support in this mess.

Finally, what advice would you like to give to the students of Istanbul Gelişim University, Faculty of Fine Arts, Radio, Television and Cinema Department, regarding the film production and competition processes?

Make lots of mistakes, don't be afraid to make mistakes. See production and film making as a need, and do not hesitate to practice every day, even every moment, in order to meet that need. Take lots of notes and reflect on those notes. These are my personal prescriptions, everyone will find and apply the best in their own way and in their own journey, but it is also worth remembering that Filmmaking brings with it a never-ending learning process, so no matter how much practice or how many mistakes are made, whatever No matter how much success comes, each story will raise its own question marks.

Production is a process that goes hand in hand with life. Inspiration struggles with a life at home and in isolation. In order to produce, it is necessary to see new things and stay in life. It should also be noted that it is a very painful process. It is very nice to get through this pain with the support of friends and loved ones. Hug your friends, if you don't have friends, try to get them. Because after a while it gets really hard. Most importantly, love your loved ones more, be sure that love is the greatest inspiration. Feed on love, not pain.

Interview with Sharaiz Aleem

17 SEPTEMBER - 20 NOVEMBER

Many participants from different fields such as researchers, artists, architects, musicians, writers, radio programmers, conductors and poets are expected to contribute to the 17th edition of the Biennial, which started on September 17, with individual and collective works. It is known that the projects of participants from different parts of the world will be exhibited in different districts within the scope of the biennial. The biennial curator invites various artists and projects to the exhibition in accordance with the theme he developed.
