


Res. Asst. Okan Kırbacı Attended "Blackmagic Design Summer Tour Workshop"


Lecturer Minel Kurtuluş shared her thoughts on her position at the Department of Interior Architecture as follows:

What is Artificial Meat in Reality and What it is not







Dear readers, we have been witnessing many discussions about artificial meat lately. We all have confusion. As you know, human beings are resistant to accepting new things. Especially when we eat and drink things we do not know... I insist on it. I will take great care to ensure that the information I will give you here is from a scientific point of view. As you know, when we have work food, it will also have a belief dimension. I think it is important that the belief dimension of such foods is examined and discussed by our theologians. I will not enter the dimension of belief in order not to overstep my bounds.

Yes, what is artificial meat? I know that the artificial name causes it to be perceived as a substance like plastic and paper. If you want, let's open the issue.

What is artificial meat?

First of all, it's good to say this. It seems that artificial meat, which is produced industrially today, will take its place on the market shelves in the near future. Artificial meat is actually real animal meat obtained by multiplying tissue cells directly from the animal concerned, for example calf and sheep. These include the meat of sea creatures. In fact, new production methods eliminate the necessity of raising animals for their meat. Since the cells of the produced meat, for example, with the same or similar structure to the tissues of beef, are used, the traditional flavor and nutritional elements that we are accustomed to are copied.

Can you give information about the studies on artificial meat?

Today, food companies in developed countries have spent more than \$450 million to produce artificial meat. It looks like more budget will be allocated. I can say that the scientific infrastructure of research and development activities is hidden in tissue and process engineering as well as food engineering. These engineering disciplines have accumulated academic knowledge for decades on topics such as cell culture, stem cell biology, fermentation methods. Here, food companies are now passionately continuing their interdisciplinary work on the way to prepare a new paradigm shift with artificial meat.

Can you talk about how artificial meat is produced?

The production of artificial meat begins with the taking of stem cells from the animal concerned and storing them under appropriate conditions.

These cells are then grown in high volumes and volumes in bioreactors. Well, if you ask what a bioreactor is... Think of an incubator in the form of a huge cauldron. Though, a necessary temperature range is sufficient for the feeding of the eggs in the incubators. However, in order for calf or sheep cells to develop and multiply, they need to be fed additionally. In fact, we feed and reproduce cells in this machine at appropriate conditions and temperatures. In other words, they are fed an oxygen-rich cell culture medium consisting of essential nutrients such as meat cells, amino acids, glucose, vitamins and inorganic salts, supported by proteins and other growth factors, similar to what happens in the body of a live calf. The changes made in the bioreactor environment also trigger the differentiation of cells in the skeletal muscle, fat and connective tissues that make up the

This process takes a minimum of two to a maximum of eight weeks, depending on what type of meat will be produced. In other words, we get the meat we want in two or three weeks. This is actually a great thing.

Will artificial meat bring advantages or disadvantages in terms of sustainability?

Due to the nature of the more efficient production process, I can say that artificial meat will have much more advantages than conventional animal husbandry. Considering the ecosystem, it is obvious that less land and water will be used. We use almost thirty percent of agricultural production as feed. It won't be needed. Thanks to all I have said, greenhouse gas emissions will decrease. All these will contribute to the protection of the ecosystem. You know, unfortunately we have to use antibiotics during animal production. In this way, we will use little or no antibiotics. This may be a solution to the problem of antibiotic resistance. As I said before, the growth of the artificial meat market in the future will bring a new paradigm shift and contribute to the reduction of deforestation and animal-borne epidemics caused by excessive agricultural activities.

Can it be consumed by vegans? Are there any health hazards?

Since artificial meat is not different from real meat in a cellular sense, I can easily say that it cannot be consumed by vegans. From a health point of view, I think it will not be a problem since it is not different from real meat.

When will we see artificial meat on the market shelves?

It's a difficult question. It would not be correct to give an exact date. John Naisbitt in his 11 Principles of the Mind states, "The best way to predict the future is to focus on the present." Then I can say this. In some developed countries, for example, in Singapore, regulations have been made for artificial meat. Some food companies have even started production in pilot-scale facilities. It is a fact that Singapore also has 'halal' sensitivity in food. In fact, this must be an indicator for Turkey as well. I think it would be beneficial for academics to discuss this issue in detail in terms of technology, health and belief. Planning large facilities for artificial meat production will require solving a number of complex challenges, such as production and cost. I guess this will take us 10-15 years. If you ask what these difficulties are... Actually, there are five basic problems. These are obtaining efficient suitable cells, establishing appropriate cell cultures, the best bioprocess design in bioreactors, and most importantly, their low cost. As a result, the first four challenges take 10-15 years, while the main thing is to produce it at an affordable price, and it takes another 15 years. In short, my guess is that it will take 30 years for artificial meat to hit the market shelves. Of course, I say this by ignoring the consumer acceptance part. This issue should also be studied. In order to solve all these difficulties, governments and the private sector also need to invest money in this work, encourage scientists related to this issue and open new research centers.

How to Fill the Internship Book?

There are some points that our students who will do their summer internship at Istanbul Gelisim University (IGU), Faculty of Fine Arts (GSF), Gastronomy and Culinary Arts Department in the 2021-2022 academic year, should pay attention to when filling out their internship notebooks.

- 1. First of all, you can download the internship book from this link. When you click on the link, click on the "Mandatory Summer Internship Notebook" section.
 - 2. Use a blue ballpoint pen or fill it digitally while filling the internship notebook.
- 3. When filling out the information on the first page of the student's internship file, you should write the class in which you are doing your internship in the summer term. The address and contact information of the workplace must be complete.
- 4. Name, surname, duty, date, signature and stamp information in the "certifying the document" section on the "registration slip" page should be filled in by the internship location officer.
- 5. When completing the "Registration slip" page, tick the 1st Group Internship box if you are doing your first internship, and the 2nd Group Internship box if you are doing your second internship.
- 6. When filling out the "Trainee Student Attendance Tracking Schedule" page, please exclude public holidays and Sundays. Complete the days. Do not scribble the days and make corrections on them. If you make a mistake, fill the page from the beginning. Signature and stamp should be at the bottom of the page.
- 7. Internship book submissions will be made by hand and the "Summer Internship Book Delivery Minute" indicating that it has been delivered must be signed by the student.
- 8. There should be the signature and stamp of the internship officer or the kitchen chef on each page of the internship book.
 - 9. Working day pages for public holidays and Sundays should not be filled.
- 10. While filling the working days, it is necessary to write down every work done in detail. Short filled pages consisting of a few sentences will not be accepted, you will be asked to fill in again.
 - 11. When submitting, print out in a transparent file or as a spiral notebook.
- 12. Internship notebook submissions should be made to Research Assistant Emel Çirişoğlu or Research Assistant Ayşe Seray Çetin, one of the Faculty Members of the Department. (Do not deliver notebooks on the desk, anywhere else, or to any other professor other than the department professors).
- 13. Submit the internship notebook within 1 month after your internship at the latest (All notebooks must be submitted before the new semester starts).



"The Industrialization of Art in the World"

shared his views on it.



Department of Communication and Design Res. See. Büşra KAMACIOĞLU emphasized that in the twentieth century, capitalism industrialized culture and industry, turned society into an industrial product, and as a result, the concept of culture industry emerged. Kamacıoğlu also mentioned that the culture industry has brought about changes in fields such as art, philosophy, architecture and literature, including the way of social life, and expressed the following:

"It is seen that popular works have emerged in similar techniques that are similar to each other. This situation shows that today's art is in danger of being standardized within the market expectation and integrating with the market.

For example, the works chosen to represent them for the new

contemporary art fair "Abu Dhabi Art", which started in Abu Dhabi in 2009, are in line with the perception created by the super-rich United Arab Emirates in the Western world, rather than reflecting the styles of the galleries. Gallery owner Larry Gagosian's "Red Diamond" by Jeff Koons (right image) with a \$12 million price tag and Damien Hirst's "Oh Midas" (image below) butterflies sprinkled with diamonds on a gold background are examples of this. can be displayed."

ACADEMICIAN INTERVIEWS

Research Assistant Tuğçe Öztürk Evaluated Contemporary Cafe Interior Designs in the Context of "Sameness"



The developments in globalization, industrialization, trade, tourism, transportation and communication technology, which started with modernism and continue today, have changed spatial characteristics, function, identity and culture by affecting societies all over the world and brought about the same (similarity, uniformity, homogenization).

Especially the dynamics, technological developments, social, cultural and political adaptation processes and economic policies that emerged in the process of modernism and globalization have greatly affected the form of spaces. With the loss of originality, locality, identity and culture, this interaction has resulted in spatial sameness rather than displaying distinctive differences and diversity.

Having completed his master's thesis on the examination of this concept of sameness that we encounter in interior spaces in the period we live in the context of cafe interiors, Res. Asst. Tugçe Öztürk's opinion on the subject is as follows:

"When the interior designs of cafes and new generation coffee shops, which are one of the eating and drinking places, are examined in the context of spatial sameness and the current styles and trends that are dominant in the designs and are analyzed through examples, Spaces, which are

called third places, are defined as places that people use for purposes such as meeting, socializing and having fun, other than home and work places. Today, the interior designs of the third places, including cafes and new generation coffee shops, give clues to the differentiation and changes occurring in the social context. Today, phenomena such as industrialization, technology, and globalization have numerous effects on the social structure in very different contexts. When the spatial reflections of these interactions are examined through the sample spaces selected from the Karaköy District of Istanbul, it is seen that the interior designs of cafes and new generation coffee shops are largely similar today.

Most spaces act with an understanding that applies whatever usage and trend is most popular at that time, and changes the interior design in line with that trend when it becomes obsolete. Such spaces do not have a specific concept of their own and they appear as identical spaces. Uniformity brings along the consequences of uniformity and homogenization in spatial design, lack of memory and loss of identity in spatial design. In order to prevent these effects of the globalization process reflecting on interior spaces, different geographies must display their unique differences and diversity by reflecting their localities, identities and cultures to interior spaces. "



We Interviewed Our Graduate Interior Architect Berkay Kumaş on His Youtube Channel



Interior Architecture and Environmental Design Department graduate, Interior Architect Berkay Kumaş, produces Youtube content that focuses on the interior architecture profession. He answered our questions about the Youtube channel named "Berkay Kumaş".

Can you tell us a little bit about the process of starting a YouTube channel? When did you open it and what was your motivation for opening this channel?


